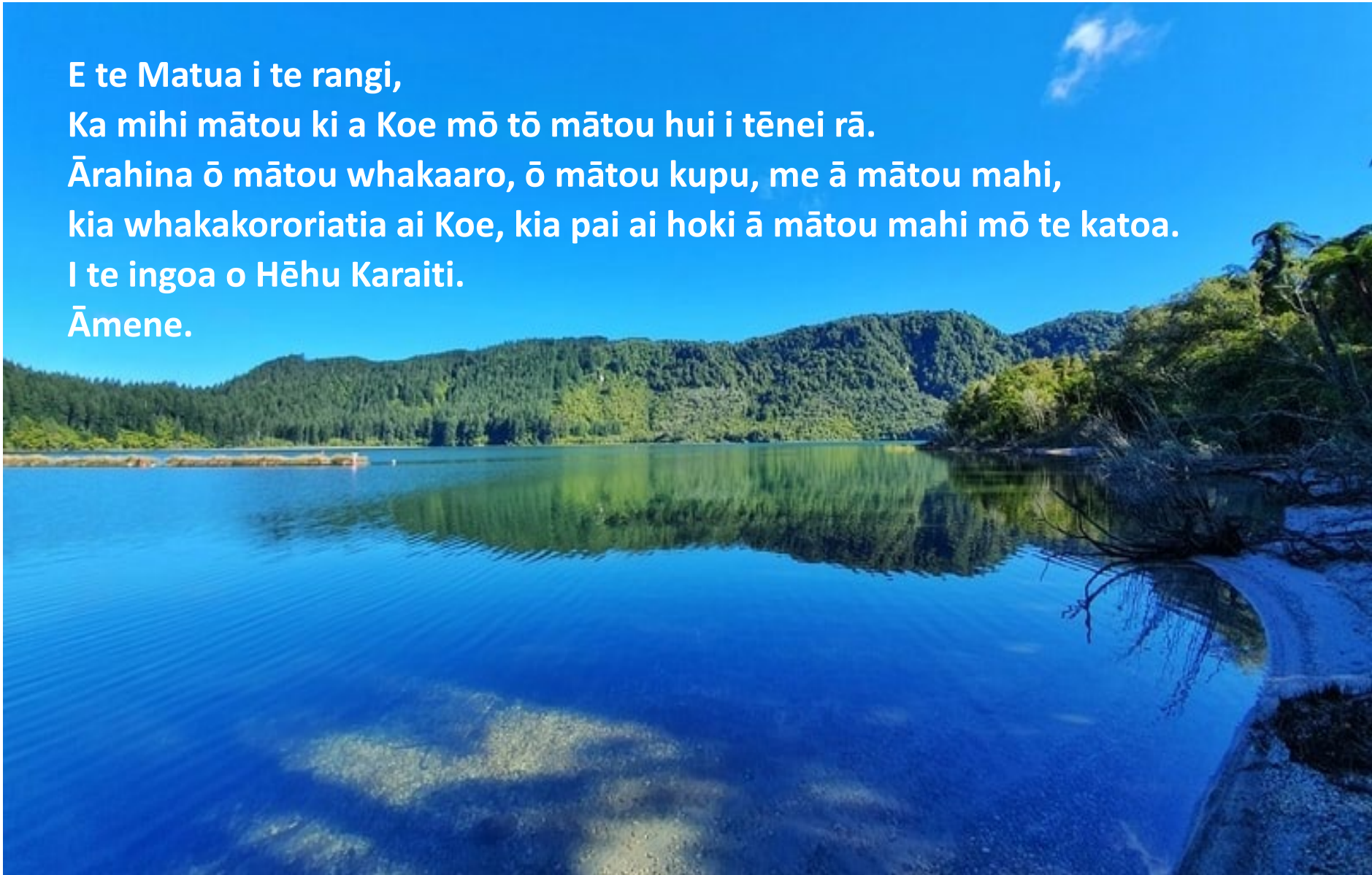

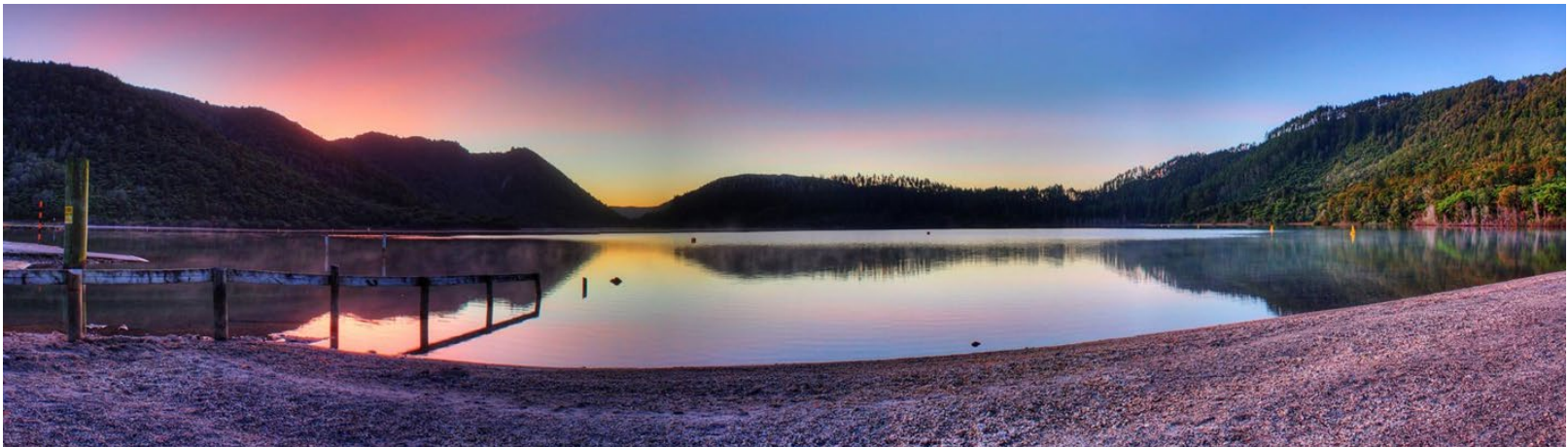

Why work at Rotorua Hospital?

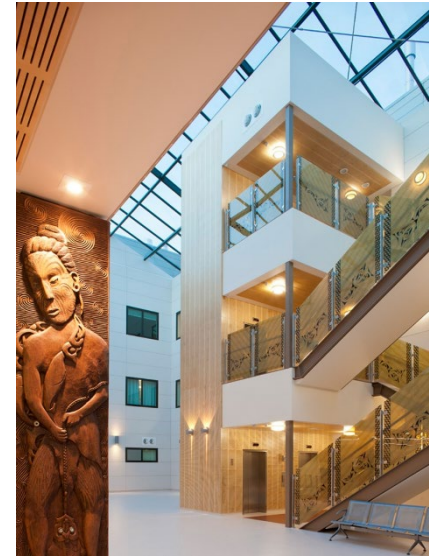
- We are a small unique regional training hospital in central North Island

- Reliever

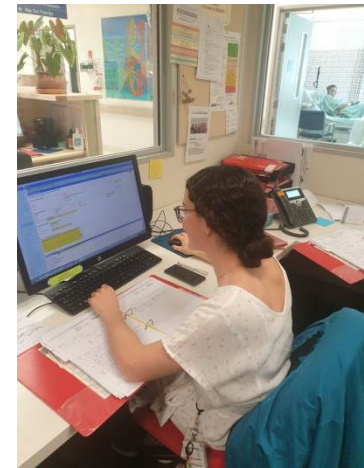


All PGY1 and PGY2 have one community based attachment
