- PVT Selection and Allocation Policy including preferential pathways and Fit for Purpose Practitioner model (please see below overview):

Fit for Purpose Practitioner Model

The 'Fit for Purpose Practitioner' model will be used to assess all applications, the model has five main domains as outlined below:

- **Clinical Performance:** Evaluates applicant proficiency and competence in clinical practice
- **Academic Performance/Achievement:** Examines applicant academic performance and achievements
- **Professional/Team Approach:** Assesses applicant ability to work effectively within a professional team environment
- **Personal Strengths:** considers the personal qualities and strengths of applicants relevant to the role of a medical practitioner.
- **Equity and Cultural Safety:** considers the applicants knowledge and performance in health equity and cultural safety.

Late Starts

Late starts for PGY1's may be accommodated in exceptional circumstances at the discretion of our districts. Please note that our ability to facilitate late starts is dependent on several factors and may not be able to be confirmed until later in the year.

Vocational Training Opportunities

The following specialty training programmes are offered in the Auckland Region: Anaesthesia; Emergency Medicine; Medicine and Sub-Specialities; Cardiology; Dermatology; Diabetes; Endocrinology; Gastroenterology; Geriatrics; Haematology; Infectious Diseases; Immunology; Intensive Care; Neurology; Obstetric Medicine; Oncology; Palliative Care; Renal; Respiratory; Rheumatology; Intensive Care Medicine; Obstetrics & Gynaecology; Ophthalmology; Paediatrics; Pathology; Psychiatry; Public Health; Radiology; Sexual Health; Surgery and Sub-Specialties; Orthopaedics; Paediatric Surgery; Urology; Neurosurgery; ORL Plastic Surgery; Cardiothoracic Surgery; Vascular Surgery and General Surgery.

In addition, those who are wanting to specialise in General Practice or Rural Hospital Medicine are supported to obtain the runs that are needed to enter training.

Rosters

Medical Runs – most consist of

- 1 Long day per week (0800-2230)
- 1 in 3 or 1 in 4 weekends (0800-2230 and 0800-1600)
- 1 in 5 night duties worked in sets of 3 and 4 consecutive nights

Surgical Runs – most consist of

- 1 Long days per week (0800-2230) 1 in 3 weekends
- 1 in 3 or 1 in 4 weekends (0800-2230 and 0800-1600)
- 1 in 5 night duties worked either in sets of 3 or 4 consecutive nights
